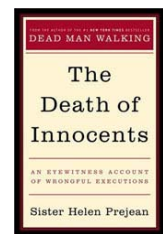

Come and hear Sister Helen's story of her prison ministry which started in 1981. Since beginning her crusade, the Roman Catholic sister has witnessed five executions in Louisiana and today educates the public about the death penalty by lecturing, organizing and writing. As the founder of "Survive," a victim's advocacy group in New Orleans, she continues to counsel not only inmates on death row, but the families of murder victims, as well.

Sister Helen is the author of *Dead Man Walking* and *The Death of Innocents: An Eyewitness Account of Wrongful Executions*. Her book *Dead Man Walking* was on the New York Times bestseller list for 31 weeks, the International bestseller list and has been translated into ten different languages. It has since been turned into a film, an opera and now a play.

Sister Helen's books can be purchased and personally autographed during the book sale and reception in Conour Atrium after her talk. All book sales go to The Moratorium Campaign which is a not-for-profit organization founded by Sister Helen whose members are seeking a halt to the death penalty.
