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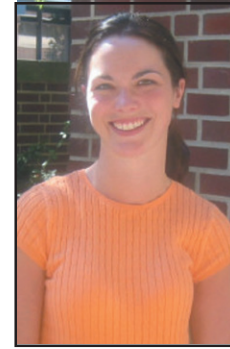

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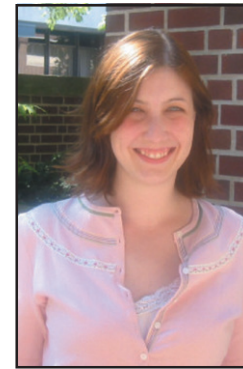

## Famous Oatmeal Cookies

1 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
3/4 cup butter, softened  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1 egg  
1/4 cup water  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 cups oatmeal (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)  
1 cup all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon salt (optional)  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1 bag chocolate chips  
1/2 bag cinnamon chips  
1 c. walnuts or pecans, chopped (optional)

1. Heat oven to 350°F. In large bowl, beat brown sugar, butter and granulated sugar until creamy. Add egg, water and vanilla; beat well. Add combined oats, flour, salt and baking soda; mix well. Add chocolate chips, cinnamon chips, and nuts if desired. Chill dough for several hours.  
2. Drop dough using a cookie scoop or into rounded teaspoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets.  
3. Bake 11 to 13 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Remove to wire rack. Cool completely. Store tightly covered.
